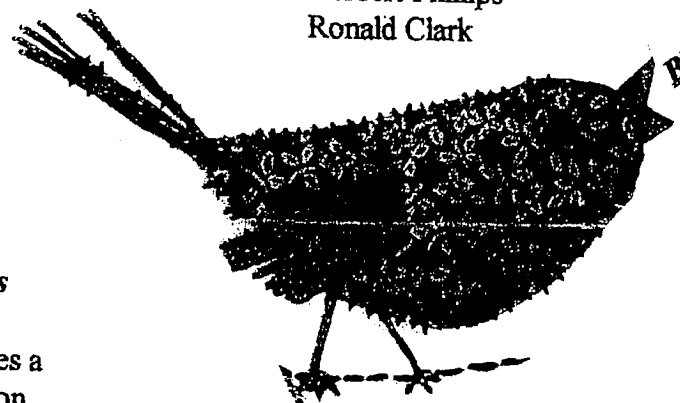

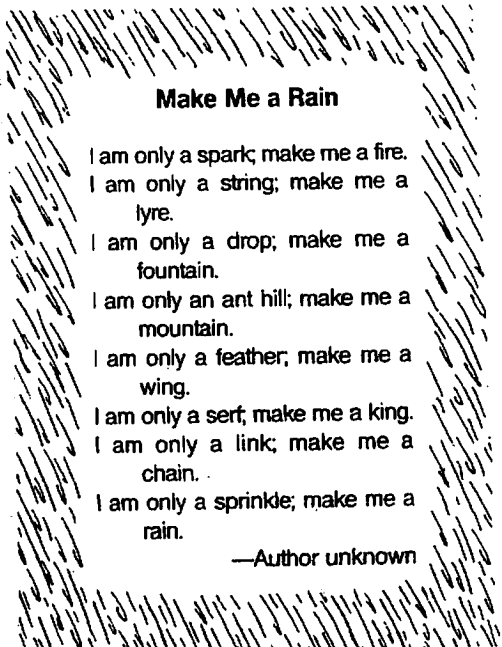

Mr. Etheridge stated that he was happy to be a part of the Phillips School family. He had served as a teacher and his children had attended Phillips.

These are two of his main beliefs: "You have to love children to be successful and you have to be able to form relationships."

He informed us that the main building where most of us had our classes will be torn down. It will be replaced. Plans call for fourth and fifth graders to be moved to Coker-Wimberly School.

He is not satisfied with the fifty per cent teacher turnover. Many of teachers are from other states.

Economic status: 89% receive free lunch. 11% receive paid lunch.

Test scores show growth. He believes in giving all children the full opportunity to develop their potential. If you set high expectations children will rise to meet these expectations.

He encouraged local alumni to attend board meetings and show an interest in what may be good for Phillips School by letting your voice be heard, support the activities, and volunteer some of your time when possible.

He is grateful for supportive parents.

Phillips Is Featured as A Part Black History

The local newspaper, *The Rocky Mount Telegram*, included an article about former "Black High Schools."

-Phillips replaced Brick High School, spoken of as "Bricks." Originally, it was a junior college, named after Mr. Brick, a philanthropist. Later, it operated as a tri-county high school with students from Nash, Halifax, and Edgecombe counties.

-The '48-'49 school year was the first year of operation with grades 8-12.

-*Mr. C. M. Carraway*, former principal of Carver High School, Pinetops, NC, served as first principal.

-1952, Change in Enrollment

All Nash County students were required to transfer to Swift Creek High School.

All Halifax County High School students were required to transfer to Eastman High School. Inborden High School was built later.

-The class of 1949 was the first graduating class. The class of 1972 was the last graduating class.
